

These improvements are making our school a better place for learning and having fun. We hope you enjoy reading our article!



Library

It was inaugurated in September 2022 and houses about 15,000 titles. The library spans three floors, with literature and children's books primarily found on floors -1 and 1. The 2nd floor features informational books and study tables. Finally, the terrace is reserved for senior students (IV°) and teachers.







Food Market

It was inaugurated on March 6th. The market opens at 8:00 am and closes at 5:00 pm. It offers a variety of foods, including hamburgers, sweets, cookies, drinks, snacks, muffins, and many other items. The market is owned by a chain called

Easy Food.

Playground

Inaugurated on March 6th, our new recreational area offers exciting activities to first and second graders during the recess. In addition to the soccer fields, children can enjoy our new playground, featuring slides, climbing walls, and much more. Come and join the fun!







Elementary Building

Inaugurated on October 14th, 2023. This two-story building houses classrooms for first to fourth grade and includes a new infirmary. The playground features three soccer fields and the new recreational area we mentioned earlier.



The White House

Our cherished "White House" has been remodeled and enhanced in many aspects. It now features six offices for the members of the school board of directors, a secretary's office, two conference rooms, a dining room, a kitchenette, a living room, and beautiful hallways.

The Aviary & The Wetland

Inaugurated in 2021, our aviary is home to approximately 55 birds, including peacocks, pheasants, ducks, and many others. Adjacent to the aviary, we inaugurated a wetland last year where you can observe a wide variety of fish, enhancing our wildlife viewing experience.







Sports Facilities

Inaugurated on May 23rd, The soccer field and athletics track underwent significant remodeling. The soccer field now features synthetic grass, while the track has been completely upgraded. Additionally, There is a new gym that is accessible during sports classes and after school. 
On the night of April 18, Tabancura School held a Pasta Night to raise money for charity activities. The event was a big success and a great experience for both families and the school.

I sat down with Ricardo Riesco Larraín, a determined 12th grader who recently tackled the daunting Cambridge C1 Advanced Exam (CAE). Ricardo shared his journey of preparing for and passing this significant English language proficiency test.

When asked about his achievement in passing the CAE exam, Ricardo humbly shared "Yeah, the exam was pretty tough, but I had amazing support from my teachers, especially Mr. Pablo Leon and Mr. Rodrigo Cuevas. They really helped me understand the material and gave me confidence."

The CAE exam comprises four sections: speaking, writing, reading and use of English, and listening. Ricardo admitted that the speaking section posed the greatest challenge. "For me, the most challenging part was the speaking section because you have to think on your feet and express yourself clearly."

When about significance queried the achieving C₁ Certification. emphasized its wide-ranging benefits. "Getting a B2 or C1 certification opens up so many opportunities. You might not need to take English classes in college here in Chile, and if you want to study abroad, you might not have to take an English test. Plus, it really improves your English skills and makes you more competitive in the job market."

Offering advice to younger students, Ricardo emphasized the importance of diligence, preparation, and self-belief. "My advice is to study hard and understand the structure of the exam. Practice speaking and writing in English, and don't be afraid to ask for help from your teachers—they're here to support you. And most importantly, believe in yourself and your abilities. If I could pass the exam, I'm sure you can too!"

Ricardo's journey to conquering the CAE exam is not just a testament to his dedication but also a reminder of the importance of perseverance and support. As students like Ricardo continue to excel, they inspire others to reach for their own goals and dreams.







Chilean Palm

Ecological Path

In our greenhouse, you can see many different kinds of plants like succulents, cactuses, and more. Each type of plant is unique and they all live together in one place. The greenhouse helps them grow well because it keeps the environment just right for them. You can learn a lot about these plants by looking at the signs that tell you interesting things about each one. It's really fun to see all the different shapes and sizes they come in!





In the wetland, there is a pond that has plants like water lilies, reeds, and horsetail. You can also see fish such as goldfish swimming around. It's a really interesting place to learn about different water plants and fish! We often go there during science class to observe how these plants and animals live together. It's amazing to see how everything in the wetland depends on each other to thrive.



In the aviary, we have about 55 birds, including peacocks, Swinhoe's pheasants, other types of pheasants, ducks, and many more.
