Remembering Our Beloved Pope Francis



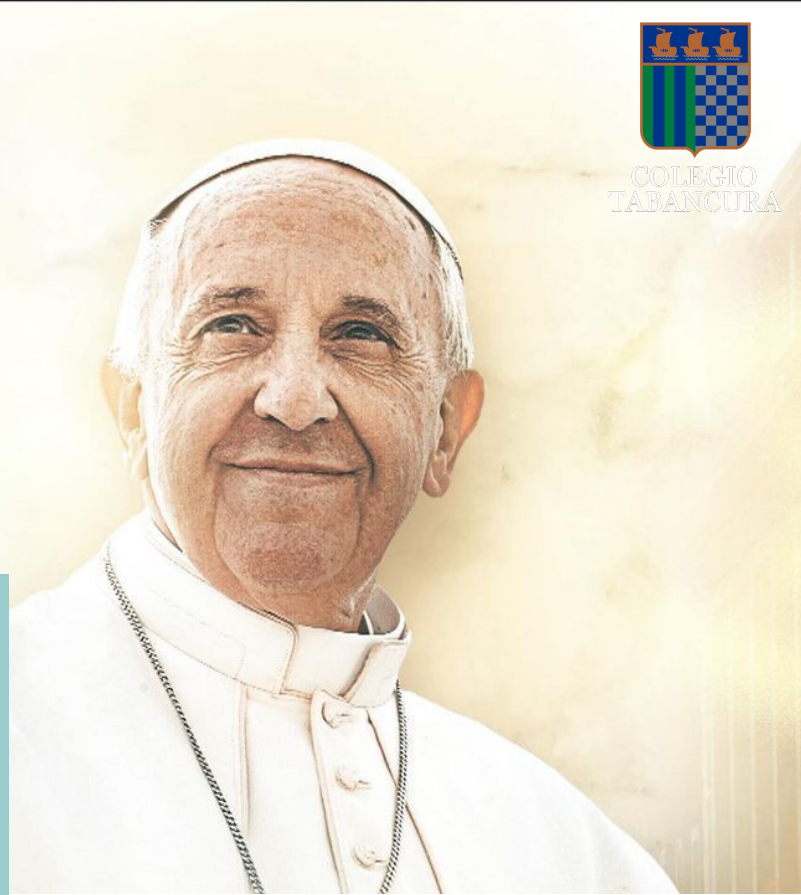

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Pope Leo XIV: A New Chapter for the Church

On May 8th, Tabancura experienced with great enthusiasm and devotion the announcement of “Habemus Papam!”, the historic phrase that marks the election of a new Pope. This remarkable event offered a unique opportunity for students, teachers, auxiliaries, and families to reflect on the importance of spiritual leadership within the Catholic Church.

From the early hours of the morning, the atmosphere at school was full of anticipation. Classes began with a special prayer and a brief explanation of the meaning of the conclave and the history of the “Habemus Papam” announcement, traditionally spoken by the Cardinal Protodeacon when a new Pope is elected. Many students expressed a strong interest in understanding how the Pope is chosen and what his role means for Catholics around the world.

To bring this experience closer and make it more meaningful, the school installed a giant LED screen in the main hallway, broadcasting a live feed from the Vatican. The camera focused constantly on the chimney of the Sistine Chapel, a key symbol in the papal election process.



At exactly 1:07 PM, the long-awaited sign appeared: a column of white smoke rose from the chimney, signaling that the new Pope had been chosen. Immediately after the traditional bells rang, the entire school community gathered in front of the screen to witness this historic moment. The atmosphere was filled with emotion, silence, and awe, as everyone realized they were witnessing one of the most significant events of the Catholic Church.

The announcement of the new Pope was more than a news event; it was a moment of communion, learning, and hope. At Tabancura School, it was lived with deep respect, joy, and a renewed connection with the Church, which concluded with a thanksgiving Mass. Without a doubt, it was an unforgettable experience for all who stood in front of that giant screen, sharing their faith as one big family.

Over time, the project moved to Chile, where it has continued to grow and reach more people. In the last four years, the foundation has become even stronger, expanding its impact through programs in art, film, and job inclusion. Today, it is a well-known organization in the field of social inclusion.

Miradas Compartidas offers a variety of programs that help participants develop their skills and talents. In its film workshops, people with intellectual disabilities learn how to create videos—from writing scripts to filming and editing. These workshops encourage creativity, teamwork, and self-expression.

In the area of job inclusion, the foundation supports people in finding meaningful work. It provides job training and helps participants during their job search. At the same time, it works with companies that want to build more inclusive workplaces.

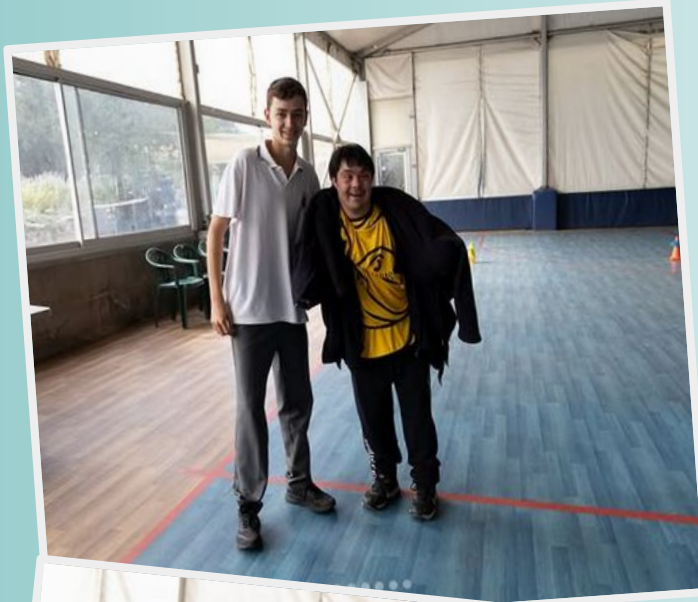
The foundation also runs cultural and artistic projects, including art exhibitions, theater performances, and other creative events. These activities give participants the chance to share their talents with the public and connect with others.

16 Years of Building an Inclusive Society



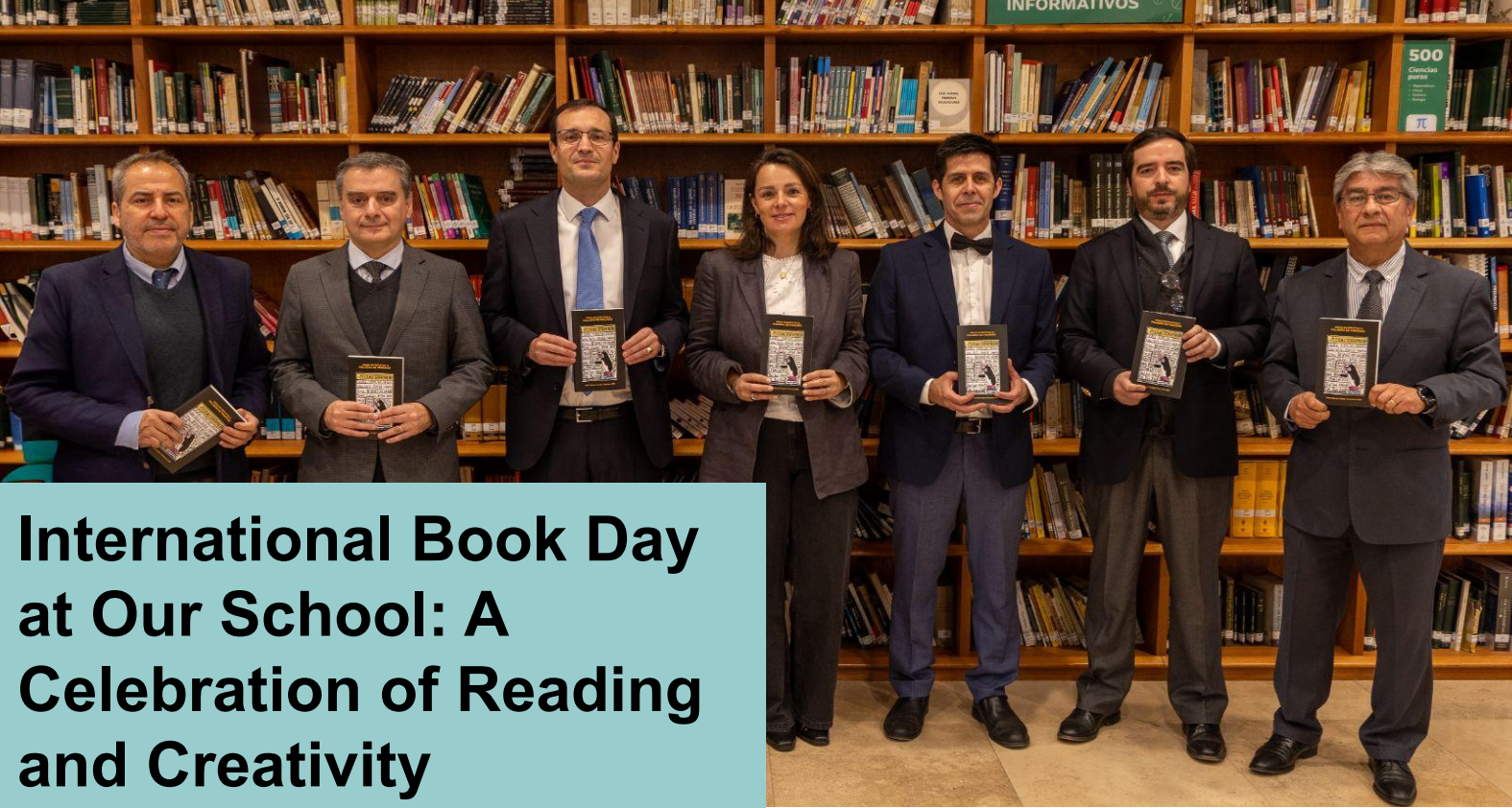

Los Montes is more than just a club – it's a place where students learn to live with joy, grow in faith, and share their time and talents with others.

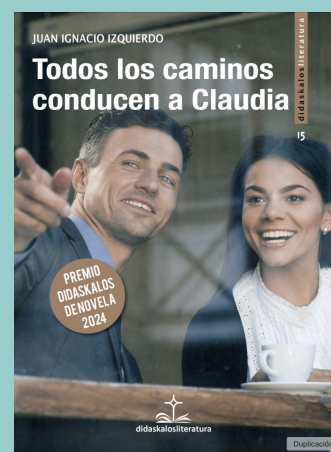




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A Novel of Love and Laughter: Mr. Izquierdo's *All Roads Lead to Claudia*

After that, we played bingo with the residents — one of their favorite activities! What surprised us most was how excited and cheerful they were. We laughed, had fun, ate some delicious snacks, and enjoyed the time together. When the bingo ended, we cleaned up and said goodbye. Then we took the bus back to school and arrived by 12:30 to continue our normal classes.

In conclusion, these works of mercy help people who are going through difficult moments at the end of their lives. We gave them joy, company, snacks, and most importantly, love. These visits also help us understand the reality many people live in and teach us how important it is to give our time and hearts to others.

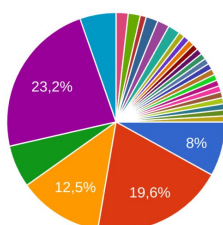

Most of us already know the school kiosk, but there are some interesting things you might not know.

The kiosk is open Monday to Friday during recess and again from 3:30 to 4:00 p.m. after school. It is managed by Easy Food Casino Chile, a company that runs school kiosks in many parts of the country.

We spoke with **Lorena Valenzuela**, the person in charge of our kiosk. She told us that some of the most popular products are Kapos, Mendocino alfajores, and sweet popotes (a candy made of flavored powder).

We also asked students from different grades what they usually buy at the kiosk. Based on their answers:

- Younger students (like 2nd and 3rd grade) usually buy sweet popotes and Kapos.
- Middle grade students (like 6th and 7th grade) prefer Mendocino alfajores and Kapos.
- Older students (from 10th to 12th grade) mostly buy sodas, sandwiches, quesadillas or burgers.

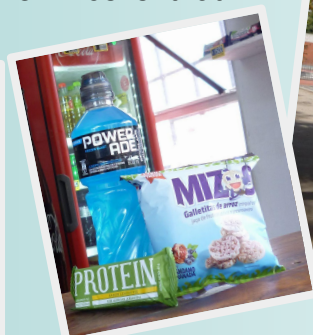
If a product is perishable (like a sandwich) and doesn't get sold, it is either thrown away or sold at a lower price. Non-perishable products are kept until their expiration date or sent to other kiosks that need them.

All the food and drinks sold at the kiosk are free of warning labels and follow Chilean food laws. This includes Law 20.606, which helps protect the health of children and teens by setting rules about what can be sold in schools. Foods that are high in sugar, calories, saturated fat, or salt — and have the “High in” black label — are not allowed.

Instead, the kiosk offers healthier options, such as:

- Water
- Natural juices
- Fresh and dried fruits
- Sandwiches
- Fruit jellies
- Nuts and seeds (without salt)
- Unsweetened cereal mixes

Thanks to these rules, our school kiosk supports healthier habits for all students.



MARIO CARACCI INTERSCHOLASTIC TENNIS TOURNAMENT

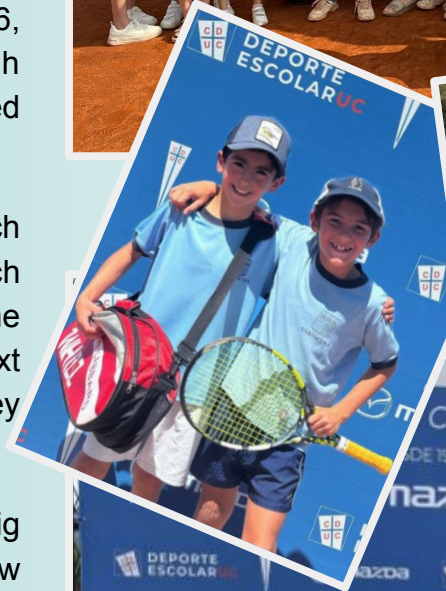

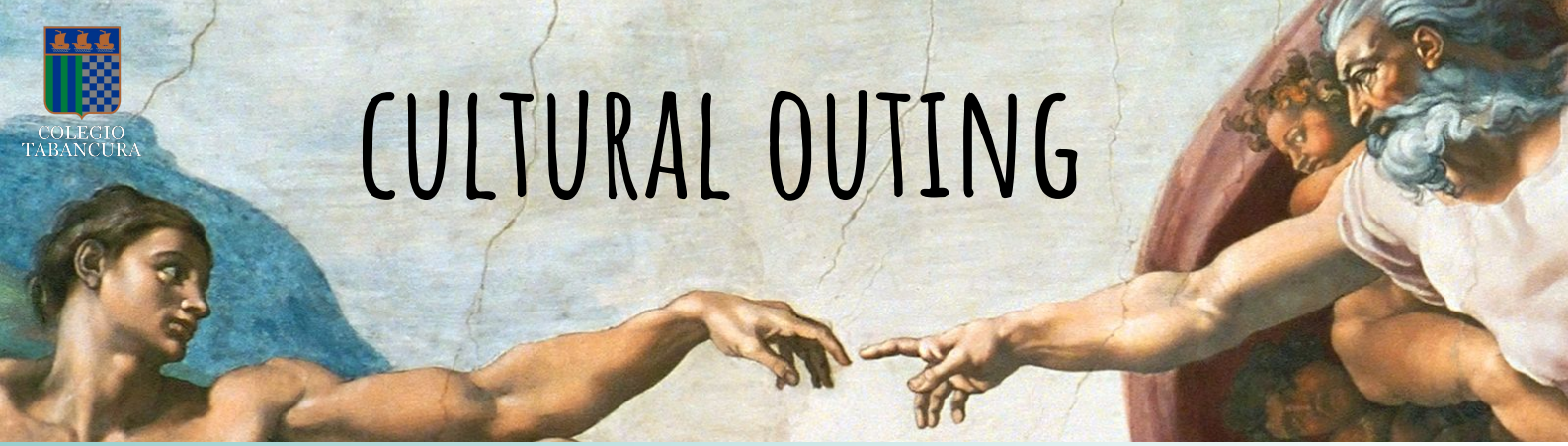

He was a French painter, born in 1790, who did much of his work in South America. He studied at the School of Fine Arts in Paris and became well known for his portraits and paintings of historical events.

Monvoisin traveled to South America and had a big impact on the art of Chile and Argentina. He even founded the Academy of Painting in Santiago. He passed away in 1870, leaving behind a strong artistic legacy in the region.

The exhibition included 75 works by Monvoisin. Some paintings came from private collections, while others belong to public museums. Many of the pieces had never been shown to the public before. Most of the paintings showed scenes from history and the lives of wealthy Chilean families in the 1800s.

This visit was a great experience for the students. It allowed them to connect what they are learning in class with real art. They got to enjoy beautiful paintings, learn something new, and spend time with their classmates in a fun and meaningful way.

Last year, there were **20 different projects**, and students helped **15 organizations** around Santiago, including foundations such as **Coaniquem** and **Miradas Compartidas**.

Many students from **II° Medio** shared their sadness about not being part of the event this year. They believe this activity is one of the best ways to help those in need and to support the environment. Over the years, **Tabancura in Action** has helped students become more aware of the difficult situations many people face in our city.

We spoke with **Mr. Ronald Bown**, who shared his view on this important activity. He explained that **Tabancura in Action** is part of the **Tabancura Acción** program, which includes **19 service projects** such as **Open Doors**, **Saturdays in Family**, **Works of Mercy**, the **Kilo Campaign**, **Holy Week Missions**, and **Summer Service Projects**.

According to Mr. Bown, the goal of this day is to **reach out to the most vulnerable people**, sometimes even those in our own neighborhoods. More than just helping for one day, he reminded us that **true service happens every day** through small but meaningful acts—like smiling, being respectful, saying thank you, and praying for others.

Tabancura in Action is more than an event; it is a way of living with generosity and care for others. It teaches us that we can always find ways to help, no matter where we are.
